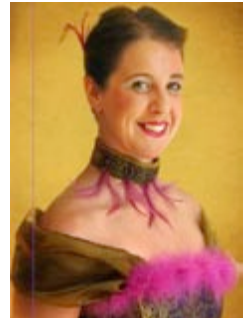

News from the Board



It feels as though we've had a very long winter this year so the current spring weather as I write, is especially welcome. I'm sure we're all enjoying the sight of the daffodils and primroses down the main drive and around the village, and don't forget to look out for that magical ring of crocuses I mentioned last year!

If you enjoy walking round the grounds you may also appreciate the opportunity to sit occasionally to admire the view. However many of our benches are in a sad state of repair and replacing these will be a priority this year. This will be part of a modest programme of improvements, that will also include refurbishing the pond and surrounding area, and unless something major crops up, spending on maintenance and improvements will be within

budget.

Our Village maintenance and development budget is not sufficient for us to undertake major works and we hold our capital funds in reserve for any such emergencies. Setting the level for this reserve and the use of our capital were subjects for our financial review meeting last November. Having obtained quotes for various sections of road, we decided to go ahead with resurfacing the road up to Butterdon which is in the worst condition of all the roads in the village. This work will be paid for out of

the 'sinking fund' which is ring fenced for road maintenance.

We've continued with our regular Open Forum meetings and in March our guest speaker was Sophie Phillips from Renewable Energy for Devon. Sophie gave an interesting and informative presentation on energy saving. Insulating materials, energy saving gadgets, and energy rating monitors were available for inspection and I think everybody learned something from the session.

Apart from Board members, 'everybody' in this case represented only six households which wasn't a great turnout. The low attendance at Open Forums poses the old dilemma. Does it signify satisfaction or disinterest? Our next Open Forum will be after the AGM in the summer and maybe we can get some feedback on this. For now, thank you to everyone who has attended and contributed at some point.

Mention of the AGM reminds me that a number of current Board members, including myself, will complete their three year term this summer. Replacements will be needed! If anyone is thinking about standing to become a member of the Board, I or any of the directors would be

happy to talk about the work of the Board with you.

Wind farm proposal for Ugborough Beacon

Olof Turbines SW, a subsidiary of the French energy company Prila PLC, have submitted a proposal for four large wind turbines to be situated on top of Ugborough Beacon and, in a surprise move, Dartmoor National Park have not raised any objections.

"We need to move with the times and consider the future of the country's energy requirements" said their spokesperson.

"The four proposed turbines will provide enough power for Ivybridge, Ugborough and Bittaford as well as Moorhaven and Wrangaton Golf Club."

The proposal is in its early stages and local groups are being consulted over the coming months to assess the reaction. There will be an exhibition in the WaterMark Centre in Ivybridge outlining the proposal and highlighting the benefits to the area. This will culminate in a local meeting to be held on April 1st

2010 at the WaterMark Centre.

"We expect a great deal of local interest and opinion" said the spokesperson "but energy prices will be reduced significantly if the proposal goes ahead which will be of great benefit to all those in the area".

Speaking off the record regarding how the view for Moorhaven residents would be affected, a spokesperson for Prila PLC said "I accept that these turbines affect views but, in Moorhaven's case, if they don't look behind them, they won't see them. And besides, they've already got a perfectly good view over the valley towards the sea."

The Gazette will keep you informed about the progress of this significant proposal.

Open Forum Renewable Energy Open Forum

March 2009

Sophie Phillips from Renewable Energy Devon attended the Open Forum on 12th March 2009 to present "The Partnership Project" aimed at educating the general public about the various ways in which we can all save out energy consumption.

The following is a summary of her talk:

No cost actions

Alter your central heating timer to reduce the time it is on

Alter your room thermostats – turning them down just 1 degree could save you 10%

Unplug chargers when they are not in use

Low cost actions

Energy saving light bulbs

Remote standby sockets

Smart meter to monitor power consumption

Draughtproofing

Hot water tank and pipe insulation

Check energy labels on new appliances

Radiator reflector panels

Medium cost actions

Loft insulation – Grants available and the return on investment is felt

immediately

High cost options

Boiler change – replacing a 15 year old boiler with a new condensing one could save 1/3 of your heating bills

Double glazing

External wall insulation

Internal wall insulation

Consider Green tariff energy

– Firms such as Ecotricity supply power from renewable sources such as wind turbines and reinvest in more wind turbines.

Renewable energy sources include:

Solar water heating, biomass heating, log boilers, pellet boilers, photovoltaics and wind turbines.

Not all of the above are either practical or economic for Moorhaven but Peter Rowlands pointed out that if someone invented a Low Attendance Turbine, Moorhaven would be self sufficient in no time :-)

CUT YOUR SPEED CAMPAIGN SUCCESSFUL

Well, mostly successful – there's certainly been a great improvement, and the majority of cars are now much, much closer to the 15mph limit on the main drive.

An occasional car can be spotted speeding through the dip by the Bus Stop and there is still a hardcore of drivers who don't seem to consider their speed at all. And I do think that that's the problem – most of even these hard core speeders don't realise how fast they're going.

I drive a venerable Ford Fiesta, and I find I have to watch my speed, literally watch the speedometer, to ensure that I keep to the speed limit. And most Moorhaven cars are newer and bigger than mine, and have a much better engine.

Top tip from the police: if you want to keep your speed down, stay in first gear. I've tried this and it does help.

There are still some issues we can all help with:

■ Many delivery vans, taxis etc are not aware of the 15mph limit. I believe it would be really helpful if we could

all pass on the 15mph limit to guests and other occasional "visitors".

■ Most of Moorhaven has a 15mph speed limit, however, there are areas which are 10mph, which need yet more care from drivers. Look out for signs.

■ There seems to be a tendency to speed outside school hours. Cyclists, runners, dog walkers and pets are just as vulnerable as children.

■ 15mph may, occasionally, be too fast. A van overtook the School Bus at about the speed limit last Wednesday, however, there was a car coming the other way, a large bus blocking sight lines and children, adults and dogs milling about. Nobody got hurt, but that was definitely more by luck than good judgement, so beware the bus!

So a big thanks you for taking this issue on board. Keeping Moorhaven safe is good for us all.

Having served in Iraq with the RAF myself, I can understand firsthand how difficult the transition back to normal life can be, and that was without a life-altering disability to adjust to.

Alcock and Brown

June 15th this year brings the 90th anniversary of the first non-stop Transatlantic flight.

Alcock and Brown took off in a modified WWI Vickers Vimy bomber from Lester's Field near St Johns, Newfoundland on June 14th 1919 and landed at Clifden, Ireland on June 15th.

News of their success spread like wildfire and they were presented with the Daily Mail's prize of £10,000 by Winston Churchill who was then Secretary of State, and knighted a few days later by King George V at Buckingham Palace.

William Nevill Cobbold (who graced these pages once before in Winter 2007) as well as being an early English International Footballer, was also something of an amateur poet. His enthusiasm and patriotism shine in the verse he wrote to mark the triumph.

CAPTAIN ALCOCK AND LIEUTENANT BROWN CROSS THE ATLANTIC

The vast Atlantic's crossed to-day
Upon a British 'plane;
Two Britishers have shewn the way,
Two men of nerve and brain.

These heroes reck not of their lives
Nor for the prize they care,
For England's glory each one strives
For conquest of the air.

No praise too high we give to those
Who sped across the ocean,
Which twixt the Anglo-Saxons flows;
We laud their grand devotion.

Sreepur Village, Bangladesh

In February Liz Scott and Stuart Newberry travelled to Bangladesh to visit an orphanage and women's project that they'd been supporting for several years. Sreepur Village (also known as Shishu Polli Plus) was celebrating its 20th birthday and Liz and Stu were invited to join in the celebrations. This project for orphans and women was set up by an air hostess, Pat Kerr. It has grown and expanded over the years offering support and safety for hundreds of women and children.

Leaving for Bangladesh everyone warned me of the culture shock. However no-one warned me that the biggest culture shock of all would be returning to the UK.

Bangladesh is a country of contrasts. On the one hand it's energetic, vibrant and colourful and on the other hand it's dirty, chaotic and poor. Walking around is an assault on the senses – it's the equivalent of being dunked in a bucket of cold water.

Bangladesh is a wake-up call like no other country I've been to. The cacophony of noise, heat and busy-ness is quite bewildering and yet the curiosity, happiness and energy of its people is so incredibly appealing.

Sreepur Village is like an oasis of calm in this chaotic world. I had expected the children to be fed



and watered and housed. However I was taken aback by the warmth and love that permeated the atmosphere.

In my naivety I had expected the sadness to hit me. Let's face it many of these children and women have experienced terrible trauma. So it was a real delight to experience the smiles, fun and joy that infused the air.

The children were no doubt on best behaviour and Shishu Polli Plus was spick and span to celebrate its 20th anniversary. The children, with

their deep dark eyes and bright white smiles were constantly asking, "How are you?" "What is your name?"

Showing us proudly around the school rooms, dormitories, work shops and kitchens they would jump in front of the camera every time we took a photo and then excitedly look in the view finder to see themselves.

One thing I soon realised was that the children loved their home and they were genuinely thrilled that we loved Shishu Polli Plus too. Their enthusiasm and pride was infectious.

Seeing how our money is spent was so inspiring. Sreepur Village is an incredible place. It gives the children and the mothers much more than just the basics of life – it's a safe environment in which they can flourish. They get an education, learn skills and are eventually weaned back into mainstream life in Bangladesh. They are given hope, dignity, respect and the ability to earn a living.

The biggest culture shock was returning to the UK. In Sreepur I left behind people who on one hand had so little and yet on the other were so



rich. The children may have only had the basics – yet their energy and vitality with life was contagious. They may not have had a 'conventional' family and yet there was a real sense of family present.

In the UK we, by comparison, have so much. However, are we as happy as those children in Bangladesh? I'm not so sure. Each of those children must have had heart-rending story and yet their smiling faces effortlessly lit up everyone around them.

Even now I'm back in the UK I'm affected by them. On grey rainy days I think back on those happy children and I can't help but smile myself. Shishu Polli Plus really is a wonderful place.

Book Club

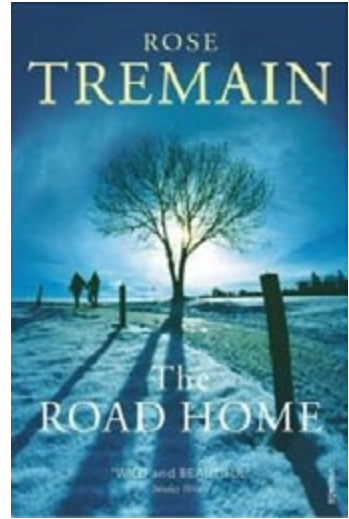
The April book is *The Road Home* by Rose Tremain
